A Season of Anticipation

Advent is a season of anticipation and hopeful, anxious waiting – a sacred time where we eagerly anticipate God’s unexpected appearances in our lives. In the Gospel of Luke, the angel Gabriel’s unexpected appearance to Mary illustrates the essence of Advent – a time of God showing up in places and in ways we do not expect. Mary, a poor young woman living an ordinary life, encountered the extraordinary when the angel announced that she would bear the Son of God. This revelation came unexpectedly, shattering the routine of Mary’s daily existence.

As we light the Advent candles, sing carols of hope, and hang decorations, let us open our hearts to the possibility of divine surprises. With expectant spirits, let us yearn for God’s unexpected Presence in our midst.

As a community, let us encourage one another to actively seek God’s presence in unexpected places and through unexpected people. Our shared journey through Advent can become a communal exploration, where we witness the divine breaking into our lives in ways that both humble and awe us.

May your Advent be a time of heightened awareness and anxious awaiting that leads you to encounter the Divine in the ordinary, and where, together, we discover God’s unexpected presence among us. ~ Pastor Charles

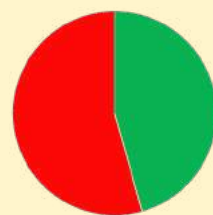
Inclusive Ministries

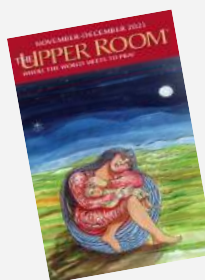

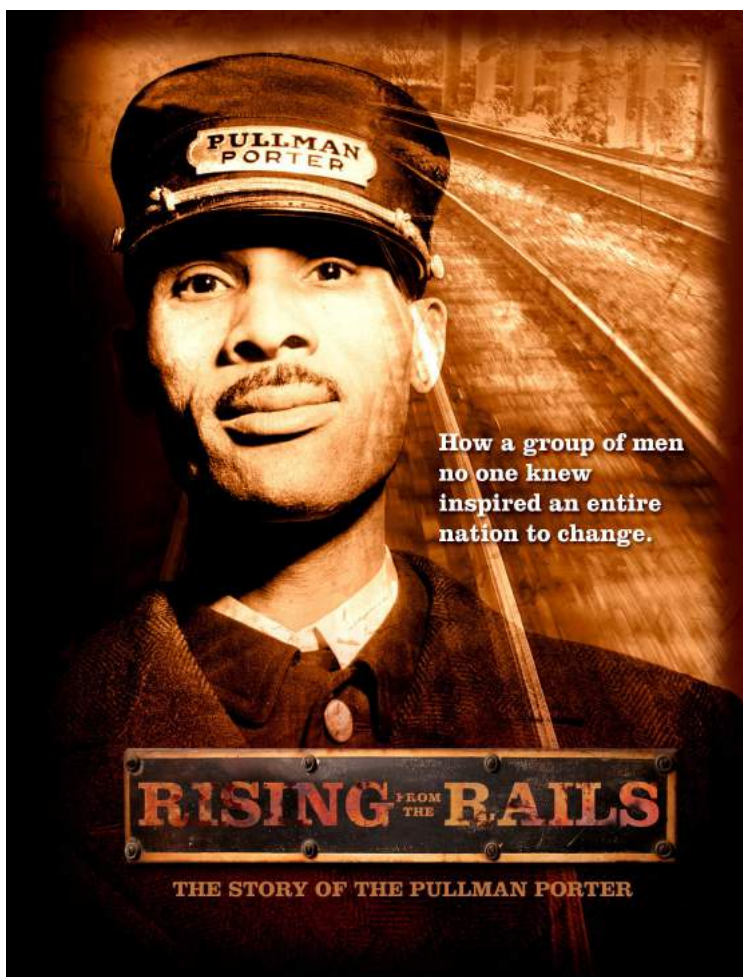

Anti-Racism Task Force

Great Things are happening in January, Check out these events: On **Saturday, Jan. 13**, Redding First UMC's ARTF will be showing the documentary *Rising from the Rails* right here at FUMC. Then, on **Monday, Jan. 15** we will honor the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr in our annual dedication and celebration—details in January!



What is BIPOC?

BIPOC is an acronym for Black, Indigenous & People of Color. It is a contemporary, umbrella term for non-European, non-white people who comprise most of the world's population. BIPOC includes people of African, Asian, Southeast Asian, Latin American, Pacific Islander, Native Hawaiian, Native American/Indigenous or mixed racial-ethnic ancestry. As a term BIPOC acknowledges the specific & varying types of discrimination experienced by People of Color. BIPOC does not

replace naming Black people & should not be used when referring to an individual or an issue that affects a specific group of people.

Such changes in terms reflect a move by People of Color to define themselves instead of being defined - sometimes in error - by white society. Today's African American/Black people were formerly called "Negroes" or even the "N-word," names given by white people. Native/Indigenous people were misnamed as "Indians," because early European explorers to the Americas thought they had arrived in India.

Science & Christian faith agree there is only one human race, with some superficial physical distinctions among groups (hair color & texture, eye shape, skin tone). Racial prejudice and systemic racism arose from these minor differences to establish, justify & make legal & socially acceptable the colonization, dehumanization, systemic violence against, enslavement & exploitation of non-white persons by white nations. White-run systems formerly deemed non-white people as "minorities," but the world now understands that BIPOC people comprise nearly 75% of the global population.

Acts 16:16-23 tells of the story of colonizers labeling & condemning Jews who were followers of Jesus. Speaking of Paul & Silas, "These men are disturbing our city and they are Jews & are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe." God calls us all to love one another & to live in harmony & peace with all people. Jesus showed an affinity for those pushed to the economic & social margins of society. BIPOC communities are among those who remind us that to follow Jesus is to pray & work for an end to racial bias & notions of supremacy in the name of the One who created & loves us all.

The term BIPOC is the latest iteration in fostering unity of purpose among marginalized persons & to uproot racism & white supremacy from social, moral, political, economic & religious systems. There is no "one size fits all" language when it comes to talking about race. Language is crucial, but it isn't the answer. The term BIPOC is simply a tool to frame a broader discussion for collective action on issues of race & gender in our community. Making the conscious effort to be more inclusive in your language can help contribute to a world that is more accepting of diversity & supportive of racial justice.

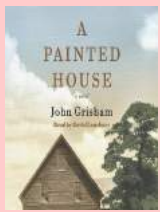

Save Money by Giving from Your IRA

If you have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are age 70 (or getting close), there are ways you can give to our local church that will strengthen our church's ministries **and** produce tax savings for you! Here are some important facts you should know.

Did you know...

People who are age 70 ½ or older can contribute up to \$100,000 from their IRA directly to a charity and avoid paying income taxes on the distribution. This is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD).

You Can't Leave Your Money there Forever.

Once you reach 72, you are **required** to start taking at least a minimum amount out of your IRA each year – "required minimum distributions" (RMD). Since contributors didn't pay tax on the money when they put it in their IRAs, they are required to pay tax on it when money comes out. RMDs can push some people into a higher tax bracket. But that can be avoided...

Give it to the Church; Avoid Paying the Taxes.

In 2006, pension protection laws allowed for **tax-free use of RMDs** for charitable contributions, saving the tax that people would have had to pay when they took this money out of their IRA accounts. These are called "qualified charitable distributions" or QCDs. Here's an important distinction: these are **NOT** tax deductions. They do *not* provide a charitable deduction regardless of whether you itemize deductions. The tax benefit is the ability to exclude the donated distribution from taxable income. This can save you thousands!

From IRA To "My UMC" – Never in My Pocket!

With a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), a check goes directly from your IRA to our church. Many people who are facing RMDs that will have tax implications could pay all their annual tithe or offering at one time, hopefully early in the year, through their QCD and never have to show it as income.

We encourage everyone to **discuss this with a financial planner, tax consultant, or tax attorney** – and be sure to let your family know. It could be a savings for you and a blessing to our church!
